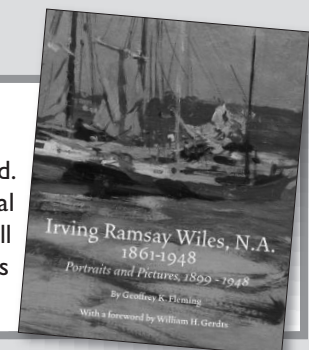

As nearly all members are aware the Society offers some great social activities each year, such as the Ice Cream Social (August 6) and Candlelight Tour (November 25). However, like many not-for-profit organizations we also must raise funds through activities like the Summer Gala. This year it will again be held at the beautiful Brecknock Hall in Greenport on July 9, 2011.

All three of the above take hundreds of hours of volunteer & staff time and the cost of holding events like the Social and the Tour is approximately equal to income derived from them. While attendance at the events provides minimal fundraising, attendance at the Gala makes a big difference to our bottom line. The key to that success is the support of our SPONSORS and PATRONS.

Sponsors provide critical support for special events in the amounts of \$500, \$750 and \$1000. From the Collection

When Geoff asked me to write a short article for the newsletter of something that came into the collection recently that I thought was interesting – I had to stop and think. There are a lot of items that I see in the collection that just fascinate me. One of the items that came in fairly recently is the below image taken by Hammond of Greenport. It is of a side wheel steam ferry, The Massachusetts, which ran aground in East Marion in October of 1877. The ship sailed for the New York and Providence Line. The vessel was caught in a big storm which wrecked ships from Delaware to Maine. In the foreground you can see the large bales of cotton which were off loaded from the ship. No lives were lost in the wreck.

From the Archives

John Corey was one of the first settlers of Southold. His grandson, David Corey, died in 1739, and is buried in the Hashamomack (also known as Arshamomaque) Cemetery. The Arshamomaque Cemetery is one of the ancient burial places in Southold and is located on Albertson Lane. An historic marker was placed by the Southold-Peconic Civic Association (now the Southold Historical Society) on the property where the Abijah Corey House was located in Hog Neck, which was a part of Bay View, Southold. The archive also includes information on the fact that Abijah Corey Jr. bought land in Hog Neck in 1800. Oliver Corey was elected to the office of inspector of elections. The Southold Historical Society archive has an original 1840 and 1854 document on file showing his acceptance as inspector of elections. Come find out more about the story of the Corey surname, and so many, many others. Missing Jacket

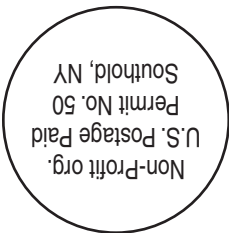
